The subdivision process may take up to 90 days. The 90 day period begins after all forms and information, required and requested by the Planning Commission, has been submitted to the Planning Commission at one of their regularly scheduled meetings, the second Tuesday of each month.

If the subdivision or septic permit is denied you have the right to appeal to the township for the subdivision or DEP for the septic issues within 30 days.

For example, if more than 0.11 acre (5000 square feet) of land is disturbed, a Soil Erosion and Sedimentation Control Plan (E&S) is required. From 0.11 to 1 acre, the plan must be approved by the Clifford Planning Commission. For areas greater than 1 acre, the plan must be approved by the Susquehanna County Conservation District www.suscondistrict.org).
