#### We Didn't Forget the Children

When planning the bicentennial celebration, we did not forget the children. Although the parade, historical displays and Civil War encampment will fascinate all ages, special attention is being paid to children's interests. We want to hook kids on history!!

On both days of the celebration at the picnic grounds, there will be old-time games and activities to keep youngsters busy. There will be a battle of oranges, hopscotch, hula hoops and many more games, as well as a tunnel of hay. Hands-on activities (for all ages) include using a corn sheller, washboard, cream separator, loom and treadle sewing machine. Watch ice cream being made with a hit-and-miss engine powered ice cream churn and get to eat some too! There will be lots of opportunities for youngsters

to interact with "old-timers" to learn more about what life was like in Clifford years ago.

delighted by "Berbaum Old-Time Music Workshop." Playing six different instruments, singing and dancing too, the Berbaums are up-close and personal and invite the children to join in. Bring your camera, parents! This program is supported by the Humanities-and-the-Arts initiative, administered by the Pennsylvania Humanities Council and funded principally by the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts.

Also on Saturday, there will be a presentation by area historian Ed McMullen. Members of the bicentennial committee have seen him perform his one-man-show and convinced us this is a "must-have." Dressed in a buckskin outfit of his own making, McMullen reenacts events in the daily life of a pioneer including firing his musket.

Sunday, July 2, will start at the township building with the veterans memorial dedication, an excellent introduction to our region's legacy of sacrifice. The lone bugler, the salute of an honor guard and the patriotic music played by the Lenoxville Band will give the ceremony the sense of respect it deserves.

Afterwards, we invite children to the petting zoo of Lewis and Lori DeJoseph, owners of In the Dell Herb Farm. This couple raises plants, herbs and animals organically. Their "old-fashion" methods allow them to speak to the children about how each of their animals has a job on the farm, such as clearing fields or producing cheese, yogurt or eggs, that goes beyond their use as a food source. The DeJoseph's will bring baby pigs, goats, sheep, chicks, bunnies, ducks and a Scottish Highlander cow, a very old breed of cow that looks like an albino buffalo because of its long white hair. Back by popular demand, JoJo the Clown will entertain with song, dance, tricks and face painting, along with baseball games and contests at the township building.

At the picnic grounds on Sunday, children will be delighted by the music from a hand-made calliope playing fairground music and more game opportunities. There will be many creative ways for kids to understand that there really was entertainment before television, X-box and ipods. Come and enjoy, enjoy!



#### **Grant Funds Barn Study**

The newly formed Clifford Township Historical Society has applied for and received a grant from the Pennsylvania Humanities Council which will support a study of the old barns in the township. The Historical Society is proud to be a part of the township's bicentennial celebration. One of the eight booths at the celebration will be dedicated to a display of pictures of all the remaining barns, courtesy of Phil and Jan Price. A video of the barn study will be shown. Experts will be on hand to discuss the old building methods, materials used and the general history of



the barns. The other seven historical booths will highlight one-room-schools, churches, agriculture, forestry, geology, the fire company and life in the "old days".

#### **Logo Adorns Quilts**

The bicentennial logo designed by Helmut Kunst is beautiful, detailed and thoughtful. Many have admired it as a work of art. It comes as no surprise that two groups have decided to have the logo adorn their quilts: the Clifford Baptist Church and the Clifford Township Supervisors. The church quilt is queen size and totally hand stitched on a cream colored background with the logo in the center. Each corner of the quilt


has a different block design stitched in it: Pennsylvania, Pennsylvania Pavement, Harrisburg and Pennsylvania Wheel. The supervisors' quilt is double size and its design comes from intricately pieced fabrics. Raffle tickets will be sold for \$2 per ticket or 3 for \$5. Both quilts will be raffled off Sunday, July 2 at the firemen's picnic grounds. Proceeds will help with the bicentennial celebration expenses. These unique quilts can be fabulously displayed on a bed or hung as wall art and will surely be a cherished inheritance. After all, it's a long time until the next centennial!

#### The Book is Here!

<u>Clifford Township: Two Hundred Years</u> by Sally Fischbeck and Patricia Peltz is here! The significance of its subject matter goes beyond the township borders. It is a glimpse into the daily successes and hardships of rural America since the early 1800s. With over 600 pictures, maps and diagrams packed into its 245 pages, witness the evolution of commerce and farming through the experiences of Clifford residents. Since the book is organized by the original 12 school districts, no corner of the township is ignored. We see the scenes, activities and faces from the distant and not so distant past. The road crew has been especially busy at Elkview Drive, where halfway through the winter, we changed from cinders to anti-skid material and noticed better results. #### Meet Your Neighbor, Harry Phillips

Harry Phillips and his wife, Helen, came to Clifford Township in 1975 and in 1978 moved to Main Street, Clifford. At that time, Harry joined the fire company, becoming an EMT in 1982 and serving as lieutenant on the ambulance crew for a number of years. He has been the fire company's secretary since 1982 and is honored to have played a part in three major



events in the fire company's history: the genesis of the fund drive, the Christmas Care Program and the relocation of the fire station to the picnic grounds. Harry volunteered as our area's Boy Scout Master for many years and has been the Clifford Township Community Alliance (CTCA) treasurer since its inception.

Harry was employed by GMAC, Wilkes-Barre office, for his entire career and retired in 1992 after 34 years of service. His experience as a sales and credit manager made Harry a qualified candidate for tax collector, a position he has held for the last nine years.

As active members of St. Pius X church, he and Helen pursued missionary work in Haiti. Helen, widely admired for her charitable work here and abroad, passed away in August 2002. In her memory, two of their children, Maura Staback and Michael Moran, with the help of the N. E. Regional Cancer Institute, have created CASUAL Day. This acronym stands for Colon Cancer Awareness Saves Unlimited Adult Lives. This has been a major fund-raiser for the Institute for the past three years.

Harry enjoys his work as tax collector, doing some traveling and riding in his 1950 Cadillac convertible. He is proud of all the positive changes taking place in the

township and plans on continuing his community service, including being co-chair of the bicentennial celebration's parade committee. Keep up the good work Harry; we're pleased to meet you!

#### **Tree Grant - Spring Planting**

It was very exciting this spring, anticipating the display of daffodils and the budding of the trees along Route 106, all planted last fall by members of the Mountain View Garden Club, the CTCA and other community activists. On April 22, these groups gathered again to continue these beautification efforts; fourteen more deciduous trees were planted around the township. Over the next month, there will be evergreens planted and landscaping done around the "Welcome to Clifford" sign. These plantings and the tree removals done last winter completely used up the funds made available by the state grant. The township's tree committee is already in the process of applying for a second grant. Tree removal is very expensive and depletes the grant quickly. There are three trees left to be removed from the Clifford Cemetery and there is a critical need for numerous removals in Royal. Dundaff is also being evaluated.
