

News from the Township Supervisors

Regular attendees at the supervisors' meetings can attest to the important work being done by Supervisors John Regan, Dennis Knowlton and Randy LaCroix. Whether it is responding to regular expenditures, flood disaster, or planning for the future of the community, these public servants have a lot on their plate and welcome public participation.

The township building continues to be improved. The bathrooms have been finished, allowing for the tenancy of the vacant rooms. Precious Ones Day Care owned by Laura White occupies one room. Another is used by Jeanna Lawrence. Her business is Ji Ji L. and Co. which offers home concierge services. Jeanna is also assisting the supervisors with obtaining grant money. A third space is available to any public-oriented service; inquiries regarding this space may be directed to John Regan at 222-9364 (leave a message). This rental money will pay for the township building roof loan, thus making the township debt-free. The tiling of the hallways has been put on hold because of the financial hardship caused by the November 16 flood. The supervisors have applied to FEMA and have received approval for the reimbursement of monies spent on major road repairs to the tune of \$240,000! Although a grant of \$12,500 will be coming from Susq. Co. Redevelopment Authority for the installation of two new doors on the front and side of the township building, they can not be installed until the floor is tiled after the FEMA reimbursement is received. It has been a juggling act to continue progressing on the much needed renovations while remaining fiscally responsible.

Another important issue has been the proposed sewer project. The State requires our water quality to be assessed every three years which necessitated stream, lake

and well testing by an engineering firm. The test results reported to the Supervisors prompted an investigation into the possibility of sewers in the Dundaff-Crystal Lake area. The plan has sparked lively debate as to its necessity, the financial impact on those mandated to hook up and the township's financial liability should users fail to pay their monthly fees. This issue has yet to be decided. The public would be well-served by attending the monthly supervisors meetings. This is only one of the many important issues facing Clifford Township and an interested and informed public can help guide their elected officials plan for the growth and well-being of the community. The meetings are held on the second Tuesday of each month at the township building. Please attend!

Marquee to Promote Community Events

The CTCA plans on erecting a marquee in downtown Clifford where public organizations can publicize their projects and events. This will be in addition to their access to the CTCA's Clifford Township Newsletter. There's Gas in Them Thar Hills...

...or so it seems!! Gas and oil companies, drilling companies and land brokers have been canvassing Susquehanna County asking property owners to sign leases for gas explorations. The "paid-up" lease money may sound good, but beware... the leases are vague and may leave landowners with little control over what happens to, on or under his/her property, should drilling take place.

Here is some preliminary information. Our area seems appropriate for shallow-well drilling, generally 3000-6000 feet deep. First is the seismic testing. Once a well site is selected, the drilling process begins – a road to the site, heavy equipment, people (including some from DEP to monitor), dust and 24/7 noise. This is short-lived, usually 6 weeks or so. Underground transfer pipe lines are installed and the land is restored. The remaining land-scape includes a road to the well site, a cylindrical tank on a small cement pad and some above-ground pipes, all usually surrounded by a chain-link fence. The request to conceal this with plantings is not uncommon. There is constant monitoring of the site.

There are many sub-surface issues: underground gas storage, underground pipeline usage, potable water testing, just to name a few. There is a PA "Rule of Capture", which allows gas to be extracted from under one property via a well on another property, without compensation unless a lease is signed. Not all attorneys are well versed in the dos and don'ts of gas leases.

On April 11th, over 185 people left standing room only at a meeting conducted by the Penn State Coop specialists, Earle Robbins, Tioga, Co. and Tom Murphy, Lycoming Co. and Jackie Root, gas lease consultant, Tioga Co. Topics from the basic creed, "before signing anything, understand everything" to a slide presentation including drilling and well sites to questions and answer time left attendees with much important information.

A subsequent meeting with Mrs. Root was held April 30th. The general consensus is to form a land lease group named SouthEast Susquehanna (SES), using Mrs. Root as a negotiator, which should provide property owners with more bargaining and protective power than signing an individual lease. A second group meeting will be held on **Thursday, May 24 at 7 PM** in the Mountain View High School cafeteria. Talk with your friends and neighbors. Everyone is welcome. Clifford Cemetery Theater Project

Preparations for a Cemetery Theater Project are underway in Clifford. The Dunmore and Waverly Cemeteries in Lackawanna County have presented well attended productions of their local history portrayed and sung by performers in their respective cemeteries. The Clifford Historical Society has given its support for development and funding through state grants for the project which is planned for summer of 2008. Ideally it is hoped that living descendents of the characters will portray at least some of the parts which include the families of: the lost boy, Eber Burns; Civil War hero Owen Phillips; the Johnson family, sexton Burgess Smith's family, and Dr. Gardner's family. Period music will be an important part of the production. The work of the great Pennsylvania American composer, Stephen Foster, will be featured. Foster's first musical composition, Tioga Waltz, was written in nearby Bradford County. Singers are greatly needed! The format of the play has been designed so that in subsequent years other stories may be easily grafted on and the play can be continually transformed as interesting and important local history continues to be discovered. Grant Beautifies Township

The Clifford Township Community Alliance (CTCA) received a second tree grant from the Northeast Pennsylvania Urban and Community Forestry Program. The \$11,000 grant is being used for tree removals and plantings. Planted last November, sixteen trees (maples, lindens and callerv pears) now line the cemetery across from the township building and three sugar maples were added to the east entrance of the cemetery on Rt. 106. Dead or dying trees were removed from the roadside in Clifford, Royal and Dundaff with homeowners sharing 50% of the costs. This project will continue into the fall. Tree project director, Cherie Swetter, would like to thank members of the CTCA, the Mountain View Garden Club, Walczak Lumber and the public for supporting these efforts. Special thanks to Meg Suraci, project manager, for an excellent job with the many records and reports and to Lynn Conrad of the Community Forestry Porgram for her invaluable assistance with applying for these grants.

Newsletter Wins Statewide Award

Clifford Township has received third place honors for its entry in the Pennsylvania State Association of Township Supervisors' 39th Annual Township Citizen Communication Contest. This is the second time the newsletter has been entered in this annual contest and the second time it has received third place in the "Class 4-Newsletters" category (2500 or under population). Entries were judged on the usefulness of the information and how well the information was communicated to township residents. Publications were also judged on their overall attractiveness and readability.

Tribute to Stephen Lynch (1917-2007)



Lonsdale House 1876. The Lonsdale House was located a hundred yards west of Route 106 on Route 374 in Royal. After the Lonsdale-Brooklyn turnpike and the Clifford-Carbondale turnpike were completed in the late 1840s, Harry A. Williams built a large public house, which he called the Lonsdale House. Soon after, he added a two-story wing to this public house which included a unique attraction. The second floor of this new section sported a 30- by 50-foot dance hall with a spring floor, an unusual feature for its time. To get that spring, floors were generally made with 3x10-inch spruce joists..."a really whippy wood." People came from miles around to attend dances and other social affairs at this popular attraction. As many as 200 people were accommodated at a time. When Lonsdale became Royal, the name of the hotel and dance hall was changed to the Royal House. It continued as a popular place for young people to meet on Saturday nights. Dance lovers from as far away as 100 miles reportedly came to enjoy the magic spring floor. Rally Wells was the proprietor when it closed in 1935. [Photo courtesy of Richard and Denise Bloxham]
