Clifford Township Supervisors

We are ending a very difficult winter weatherwise. Fortunately, our efforts to outsource snow removal and road upkeep seems to have been successful. As mentioned at our last township meeting, we received more compliments than complaints concerning the township roads. Now, however, it is time to look toward spring road maintenance. Along with ditching, grading, and dust control of dirt roads, we have contacted the State for recommendations regarding how to write bids for the paved roads in the township. We have set aside money to continue paved road repairs on Elk View Drive and Welsh Hill Road.

During the winter months, more work was done inside on the township building and the new property we acquired across from the cemetery. With the coming of spring, we will continue our funding support of the Parks and Recreation Board's efforts in improving our recreation area. This year, hopefully, we will complete projects such as a picnic pavilion, benches, and improvements in the walking trail.

An additional project which is currently under discussion and final planning is a proposed "Children's Garden" promoted by the Clifford Historical Society. Final agreements and plans have not been completed at this date, but all the supervisors have agreed in principle to the development of this "adventure" garden and believe that it will be just one more improvement in the quality of life of our residents.

As always, the supervisors are continuing to work to make Clifford an even better place to live, and we invite all to our meetings on the 2nd Tuesday of each month at the Community Center. Be part of the continued progress in the township.

Park and Recreation Board

The Clifford Township Parks and Recreation Donation brochure is inserted in this newsletter. The brochure lists all the ways you can help our beautiful community park grow. Act 13 gas funds, a grant from the Endless Mountains Heritage Region, and a DCNR Bureau of Recreation and Community Conservation Partnership Program grant have helped to get the park started. Much is still planned to be accomplished. See map on Children's Garden card. The township now owns 20.5 acres. All of this space will be utilized for recreational activities. The walking trail is now one-half mile. Long term plans have the trail at least doubling in size.

So come enjoy the park! Bring the young ones to play, take your dog for a nice walk (with doggy bags, please), watch a little league game or just sit by the stream and enjoy the peace and quiet. You will be impressed with the quality and beauty of the place.

Rail-Trail Spring Cleanups

The Rail-Trail Council has registered two trail cleanups with Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful for this spring. The first will be a general trail cleanup scheduled for the D&H Rail-Trail from Simpson to Union Dale on April 18 at 9 am. Volunteers will meet at the Forest City trailhead and head either north or south. Bikers are welcome. Trash collected will be left trailside in bags to be picked up later.

The other cleanup will attack an illegal dumpsite on the Endless Mountains Trail, off of Rose Road, east of Montrose. It is scheduled for May 9 at 9 am. With the assistance of Pennsylvania Environmental Council, we are arranging to have a dumpster on site. We also are looking for the assistance of heavy machinery to pick up large items and get them into the dumpster.

Clifford Township Volunteer Fire Company

Volunteerism, fundraising and apparatus replacement are the focus for 2015. Volunteerism is dwindling throughout the country and is no different in our home town. I'm sure many of you have seen or read the recent reports of many area volunteer ambulances closing their doors citing lack of volunteers and funding. The fire/rescue service in the region suffers from many of the same factors. There has been an approximate 70% reduction in active volunteers over the last two decades. Those reductions weigh heavily on all aspects of fire company operations, including administrative needs, field operations and fund raising. The normal response from perspective volunteers is "I don't have the time." The current volunteers are faced with family and work like most folks, yet they still manage enough time to help protect their fellow residents. We ask you to take some time and seriously consider volunteering with us in some compacity.

The major fundraisers start very soon. The first is the fund drive you will receive in the mail and this is one of the biggest sources of revenue for the department. Please donate to the best of your ability. Next is the annual picnic and this requires over 200 volunteers to operate. With help from you, the community, we are able to make this fund raising event a success.

Lastly, the fire company established an apparatus replacement program over 25 years ago that would provide the responders with the most up-to-date and safe apparatus while remaining fiscally responsible. As the response needs continue to change within our community, it is of utmost importance to continue apparatus replacement in small steps toward providing the best possible service. You will see some changes in apparatus for 2015. In March, the fire company took delivery of our new ambulance. It has many updated safety features for both responders and patients, along with a 4-wheel drive chassis for challenging terrain in the coverage area. In addition, the fire company has begun the process of replacing our rescue truck. This vehicle, along with the ambulance, are two of the most used pieces of apparatus in the fire station. Our old rescue truck has been sold and you will see a "reserve rescue" handling the incidents until the new rescue arrives.

The Mountain View Garden Club held its first meeting of the spring season on March 17 at the Clifford Fire Hall. The program on organic farming was presented by Liz Piriczky from Overlook Farms at the Fuller Estate in Dalton. Upcoming meetings scheduled to be held at the fire hall include a presentation on flowers for pollinating on **April 18** and the art of bonsai on **May 19**. Both meetings will start at 7:00 and the public is invited.

On June 7 the garden club will sponsor its 11th annual **Plant Exchange & Marketplace** at the Clifford Firemen's Picnic Grounds. The marketplace will be held from 11:30 till 3:00 and will feature local artisans, food and music. The plant exchange and sale will be held from 1:00 till 3:00 with perennials for sale from local gardens. You also have the option of bringing two potted perennials from your own garden to exchange for two perennials of like size and value. Many local gardens have benefited from our plant exchange and sale over the years by obtaining very reasonably priced perennials which have been locally grown.

The garden club provides book scholarships each year to a graduating senior from both Mountain View and

Forest City High Schools. The student must be enrolled in a college or university or certificate program to pursue his or her interest in a career related to the environment, land, horticulture or ecology. Some of the many possible majors include agriculture, forestry, biology and landscape architecture.

Another project of Mountain View Garden Club is to encourage community pride in keeping our surrounding areas in good repair, clean and attractive. An annual *Home Town Pride Award* is given to a business or organization which has shown a commitment to beautification of the Elk Mountain area and surrounding communities.
