Meet Your Neighbor

William "Buzz" Boomer was born and raised in Rochester, NY but for the last eight years he has called Clifford his home. He was employed at the University of Rochester for 30 years as their swimming coach while also performing other duties including supervising the recreation program and coaching soccer and track. He did not have a background in swimming and, interestingly, he learned to swim while training to be a coach.

William was first asked to coach swimmers in training for the Olympics in 1990 and has been involved with Olympic training ever since. He has coached individuals for the Olympics in Barcelona, Atlanta, and Sydney. This past July he attended the Olympic Training Camp at Stanford University in California where he worked with both men and women who were on their way to the Athens Games. Some of his trainees won their respective matches there and William feels a well-deserved sense of accomplishment and pride in this.

His task with the Olympic swimmers has been to develop their swimming technique. He describes the nature of his teaching method as tuning a fine instrument, the instrument in this case being the swimmer's spine. Swimming athletes can only be at their best when their spines are in proper aquatic alignment.

For the last fifteen years, William's involvement has been international, working with coaching staffs and swimmers of Australia, New Zealand, Great Britain and many Scandinavian countries. This past September he did a swim clinic for coaches in Finland.

William lives on Airport Road in Clifford Township with his wife, Sally in their beautiful log cabin which they built from scratch. Sally's ancestors have been residents of



this area since the early 1800's. When not traveling around the world to work with swimmers, William takes pride in caring for their

cabin and the equally attractive surrounding wooded acreage. Pleased to meet you, neighbor!

Clifford Fire Co. Honored Site of Pilot Certification Program

On Friday evening October 15th and Saturday October 16th, a goal eighteen months in preparation became reality. The Clifford Township Volunteer Fire Company made a monumental step for not only itself, but for the majority of fire companies in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The step taken was to successfully offer Fire Fighter 1 certification in the field.

Typically a company must travel long distances with their personnel to a fixed training facility, enduring significant expenditures for testing, lodging and travel. Through an unprecedented commitment from our members, Greenfield Fire Company Chief Fred Bales, and many of Greenfield's members, we were able to bring a pilot certification program to Clifford. Chief Bales served as the test site coordinator through the Pennsylvania State Fire Academy and assisted in organizing the program. Our members spent countless hours training and preparing for the certification opportunity. In all, members from Clifford, Greenfield, Hallstead, Edwardsville, and Whites Crossing fire companies participated.

Currently, Fire Fighter 1 is a voluntary certification that tests fire fighters on written and practical skills. This certification proves a person has demonstrated competency in the knowledge and skills required in a specific field and is a prerequisite to many specialized and advanced courses. To qualify for this program, the fire fighter had to posses many prerequisites including training in the essentials of fire fighting (88 hrs), live structural burn session (16 hrs), hazardous materials training (4 hrs min), medical training certification (most had 68 hrs min) and CPR/AED training (8 hrs).

The State Fire Academy awarded Clifford Township Volunteer Fire Company the pilot certification program after Clifford demonstrated it could provide facilities for a written test, offices for the evaluation staff, and the resources and facilities for 26 practical skill stations. With minimal upgrades to the picnic grounds done by its dedicated volunteers, Clifford Fire was able to rise to the challenge: a search maze was constructed, replacement stairs and a working fire hydrant installed to name a few of the upgrades.

During the two days, Clifford Fire was honored to host the event along with the Pennsylvania State Fire Commissioner Ed Mann, and other State and County certification committee members present. A review of the pilot must be completed but initial comments are very positive. If this pilot is deemed successful, Clifford Township Volunteer Fire Company will have set the stage for "on-the-road" firefighter 1 certification in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania! Clifford Township Volunteer Fire Company will be the first fire company in Susquehanna Co.to be an official participant in the Professional State Certification program.
